As you all know, we had our National Convention in Ottawa in August and also commemorated the 60th Anniversary of the end of World War II. What an event!! Ontario Region, their Executive and Veterans Affairs Canada did a superb job of coordinating the gatherings – from transportation, accommodation and food – it was terrific! The convention was attended by over 700 people who took advantage of the event to have family reunions, birthday and anniversary celebrations. I thoroughly enjoyed meeting and talking to so many of you – it's wonderful to put faces to names now. It was a busy but very satisfying time. I am sure there will be more of a report in the newsletter but I just wanted to give a big WELL DONE and THANK YOU!! to everyone who worked on this huge endeavour.

Our National Elections were also part of the Convention. There were some issues with timing of the ballot returns. This was discussed at the Convention and hopefully with the revisions that have been made this will not happen again. Thank you to all who were involved in the Elections – the Committee – for

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the time that they took to do this important task, the members – for your nominations, acceptances and for voting. This Association has been fortunate to have some incredible people to accept positions, Nationally and Regionally, who realize the importance of the goals that have been set and who want to work to see them happen. Thank you all!! The election involved one position, that of 2nd Vice President and the Executive are pleased to announce that **Helen Wedge** from Atlantic Region has accepted this position. The other acclaimed positions were: 1st Vice President, **Murray Doull**; Secretary/Membership, **Jim Trick**; – both from BC Region; Treasurer, **Barry Mitchell** and President, **Carol Hadley** both from Manitoba Region. Welcome Murray, Helen, Barry and Jim - I look forward to working with you in the months ahead.

I extend my heartfelt appreciation to the National Executive that have stepped down – **Neil Darrah**, 2nd Vice President and **Lucette Mailloux-Muir**, Secretary/Membership we are truly grateful for your time and expertise.

Another item of the Convention was the National Survey that was sent with the election material. The National Executive felt it was time to see if our members had any issues with the direction of the Association. Our members' opinions are important as we want to meet your needs but also to challenge you to get involved with the programs either Nationally or in your

Region. It was very satisfying to see that basically we are on the right track – thank you for your comments. There were not too many suggestions, other than more communication. Between the National and Regional newsletters our members should be receiving information about four times a year. Then there is our website (www.hkvca.ca) that has past, current and future events highlighted. Some regions have telephone contacts also - this seems to cover a lot of ground with communication but we are always open to suggestions. If anyone wishes to make comments or suggestions please do so as we appreciate your input.

You will see in the newsletter reports that our Association is slowly growing – and that is wonderful. With more members, the finances will come to build and increase the programs that have been and will be initiated. Presently we operate on a shoestring budget – why not increase the dues? Personally I believe our focus should be on program, to grab and maintain the interest of our members and to encourage other people to join. However it is a “catch 22” situation as you need money for programs. The charity status that has been established should be given more emphasis to our members as it is a benefit to them and it would help to cover the initiation and maintenance of our projects.

The direction of the Association so far is towards Education – we would have a broader base of potential

membership by starting with our youth. They are also our future. We need to encourage our children, grandchildren, and other family members to join the Association to sustain our membership. Promotion of the use of the curricula in schools and use of our website would certainly reach and generate interest in the community. Ontario Region has the "Ten Lessons" in French translation and will be issued soon that will benefit many school divisions. Their involvement with the Port Perry school division project and trip to Hong Kong, is a tremendous effort in community relations with 200 + students focusing on the Battle of Hong Kong. Something similar to this could be started in any area.

Also media – I don't think we are utilizing the media sufficiently to reach the people in each community. When each region is holding a meeting or other function, this would be prime time to use the media to broadcast the fact to the whole community, not just the members. This is why a publicity chair would be important, especially at the National level, to ensure uniformity of the information that is issued and would also assist the Regions.

The regions need to build relationships with other service groups, like the legions and specific military units that are in the area. Then take part in their wreath-laying ceremonies or other commemorative events to show support – also invite them to your ceremonies – this serves to promote our 'C' Force and the Association. Invite them to attend your social functions and they would usually reciprocate – this helps to establish a camaraderie and added support to your events.

Encourage your vets and members to speak in schools, churches, legions, service groups, etc to show that there is a viable interest group serving the Battle of Hong Kong and 'C' Force. Manitoba Region has been doing this and the word is spreading with more invitations – there is a financial gain, as a honourarium is usually given to the presenter.

Another initiative might be scholarships. In the past, there has been a National Scholarship but the funds diminished and it folded – but this could be picked up again and another use for the charity receipt.

I am sure there are other ideas in the thoughts of our Executive and members but in order to initiate new projects, capitol is required and more importantly, people to coordinate and maintain it. The drive and momentum must come from the members – the Executive is keen to do the running with this incentive.

In closing, from my family to yours, we extend sincere best wishes in the seasons ahead for peace and contentment. God bless!

The trip received much media coverage, so everyone should, by now, be well informed of all the activities. I did submit a brief account in "The Torch", the Quebec newspaper, which is now posted on the HKVCA web site.

Let me just say that we Hong Kong Veterans, the six of us who were there, could not have been treated better by the Veterans Affairs team, the wonderful students (some 210 of them) and their magnificent teachers, and the 38 HKVCA members who accompanied us on all the ceremonies that took place. Ed Shayler replaced George Peterson when George had to bow out.

In Hong Kong I was contacted by Toby Brown, an archaeologist who lives in Hong Kong. He had discovered some shell casings on Mount Cameron, one of the battle sites. I plan to mount them on a board and will photograph them to be shown in a future newsletter. The actual fragments I will expose in the Baie des Chaleur Military Museum.

The Minister of Veterans Affairs sent me a plaque thanking the Hong Kong Veterans Association for our part in the celebration of the Year of the Veteran. I have scanned it and will send a copy to be used in Wasureru-Nai, if it is feasible.

Greetings to all our members from 'Sunny Manitoba'. I'm pleased that we are once again able to communicate with the complete membership through this newsletter and I thank those who are diligent enough to gather all this information, assemble it, and send it out to over a thousand people. Well done!!

As your Treasurer, I am concerned about how a small organization like ours can survive financially with so few resources upon which to draw. I always have my eye on our bank account while continuing to seek ways to make it grow. The national association only has three sources of income—primarily our dues, which are purposely kept to a minimum so that we are readily accessible, secondly donations, which are always welcome but over which we have no control, and thirdly the sale of merchandise.

This third item is something we can all work at and it represents an opportunity to put the HKVCA on a more solid financial footing. Each Region has their own methods of fund raising and they are allowed to keep all the proceeds from their efforts. However, in addition to this, there are a few items which are supplied by the Corporate Office and proceeds from their sales remain

with the national account. They include:

I know it's hard to please a national executive but we continue to search for ideas that might "click" with our membership. National Conference Wrap-Up – Pat Turcotte

What a weekend it was!! From the Hospitality Room conversations starting Thursday night to the closing breakfast chats on Monday morning, the Lord Elgin Hotel in Ottawa was an exciting place to be.

The activities began in earnest on Friday morning. Even if you hadn't signed up to see the Changing of the Guard, or the tours on Parliament Hill, the Governor General's Foot Guard Band passed the hotel that morning, and every morning, so that the guests were able to enjoy the marching and the music as they went by. What a colourful way to start the day!

Friday afternoon involved four different sessions. The first was the HKVA luncheon for the Veterans, so the veterans were able to get together at the very start of the weekend. The second was the Board of Directors' meeting, held in the Penthouse Suite – a most relaxing atmosphere.

The third session was a very stimulating talk by Nancy Hamer-Strahl, explaining the trip that she and over 200 students and their teachers will take to Hong Kong in December to honour the soldiers who fought at Hong Kong. They will be involved in ceremonies there in the first week of December, one of which will be the burying of a memorial capsule just outside Sai Wan Cemetery containing works created by the students who, as part of their course work, have researched a Hong Kong veteran and have reacted to his story with poetry, songs put on CDs, stories, videos and art work of various kinds. All their thoughts and ideas have been

transformed as a permanent memorial near the spot where many of the Canadian soldiers are buried.

The fourth and final session of the afternoon was an inspiring lecture by Vince Lopata, giving those present a very clear picture of the Interpretative Centre which the Organizing Committee based in Manitoba has projected as the home for all the information out there that could relate to the soldiers who fought in Hong Kong. The plans are quite exciting and the presentation is very well-organized. Those who were able to see it were very impressed. There is much to look forward to in the future.

On Friday evening, everyone boarded buses to the National War Museum for the official presentation of a plaque honouring the soldiers who fought in Hong Kong. The plaque will have a prominent place in Ottawa to help ensure that the Battle of Hong Kong and those who fought there are well-remembered by Canadians. We were well-represented by Phil Doddridge, National President of HKVA and Carol Hadley, National President of HKVCA, speaking on behalf of all of us.

Saturday morning the Annual General Meeting of the Association (HKVCA) was held in the Pearson Room at the hotel. With the Remembrance Protocol as a preamble to the meeting, the reading of the Honour Roll, the skirling of the bagpipes, and the trumpeter's "Last Post" and "Reveille" reminded everyone present why we had gathered there. The meeting itself gave members of both associations, HKVA and HKVCA, an opportunity to welcome the

attendees and to bring them up to date regarding ongoing activities.

Special meetings were held in the afternoon, with Ron McGuire giving a slide presentation involving "C" Force, and the Treasurers from all six Regions getting together with our National Treasurer, Barry Mitchell, to compare notes and discuss the challenges facing an organization as large as HKVCA.

Saturday evening was an opportunity to recognize all the veterans present at the Convention with a special gift provided by the Ontario Region. There were 71 Hong Kong veterans present, as well as 64 other veterans of the fighting in the Far East, including Burma Star, Burma Bombers, merchant seamen and sailors from the H.M.S. Uganda. All were honoured, and all seemed very moved by the occasion. The gift each man received was a clock with a special plate on it naming the veteran, and his unit, and in the case of the Hong Kong veterans, the Hong Kong insignia was there. Our guest speaker, following the dinner, was Cliff Chadderton who is Patron to both organizations, HKVA and HKVCA. He has been active on behalf of the Hong Kong veterans for many years. John Spear then provided musical entertainment, and introduced the song he had written especially for the Hong Kong veterans called "Christmas in Hong Kong, 1941". Lively music by "Assembly Required" had many up dancing, and a Cash Draw was held at various points during the evening. The list of winners will be posted on the Website when all those who won prizes have been reached.

The most important occasion of the weekend took place on Sunday morning at 11

a.m at the National War Memorial Cenotaph. Governor General Adrienne Clarkson spoke, many wreaths were laid and prayers were offered. The soldiers who fought in Hong Kong and other areas of the Far East were honoured, as were those died in the prison camps of Hong Kong and Japan. There was a touching moment when a group of children offered large poppies to each of the veterans attending. The flypast and the parade that followed was the finale, with the veterans themselves taking the salute.

Following the Memorial service, the families and friends of the veterans were invited to a luncheon in the Convention Centre at which the Minister of Veterans Affairs, Albina Guarnieri socialized with those attending. The veterans themselves, their wives, the caregivers and the widows were then bused to Rideau Hall for a reception with the Governor General, at which she spoke most movingly about her special connection with the Hong Kong veterans. After a motorcade through the city in 10 articulated buses, with police escort, the veterans were ready for the evening's Gala at the Crown Plaza Hotel.

Before dinner, Minister of Veterans Affairs Guarnieri spoke to the group about her focus for the present and for the future in Veterans Affairs. The meal was followed by Terry Kelly's entertaining video, which he combined with a live presentation that many in the audience found very special. The Gerry Helke Orchestra provided great music for dancing, and the evening concluded in a lively fashion, with many of the veterans "strutting their stuff".

As everyone prepared to leave the next morning, there was no doubt that the Convention had been a great success, and many were heard discussing meeting again in 2007.

On behalf of the Ontario Region, may I thank all of those on the Ottawa Committee, in particular Derrill Henderson as its Chair, all those working with Terry Tobin in Veterans Affairs, such an important part of the celebration, and all of the many volunteers who helped look after our 719 registrants so well.

Phil Doddridge, as National HKVA President, and a member of the National Executive, has been a special strength for the HKVCA organization as well. I thank him and all of those who have made the four years I've been involved so special.

I feel it important to mention the contributions made in Ontario by the current Executive, and those working with us.
