Memorial Wall- Phase 1 complete!

Congratulations! We are
have reached our Phase 1 financial
goal of \$100,000.

The building of our
Memorial Wall will encompass
three phases and our fund raising
activities will reflect these steps,
which are necessary for a project of
this size. First, we estimate that the
value of the actual wall itself,
material and labour, will cost about
\$100,000 and our initial objective
has now been reached to cover that
amount. The second challenge is to
conduct the various studies which
are necessary to erect a monument
in the heart of a major city and we
must address the costs of
environment studies, foundation
analysis, design configurations, and
so on. This could cost us another
\$20,000 and must be completed
before building permits can be
issued. Finally, there are other
considerations that we might want
to address once the wall is built,
such as a statue of Gander, benches
for viewing, perimeter lighting and
so on. We are allowing another
\$30,000 for a third phase to
accommodate these items.

We have the help of some
wonderful people who will donate
their expertise or donate to the
project, like **Jim Lennox**,
Landscape Architect, a structural
civil engineer, **Rick Cuniffe**, and a
geotechnical engineering company,
DST Consulting Engineering. A
graphics expert in Winnipeg,
Lauren Heinrichs, granddaughter
of **Ferd Poitras**, is reviewing the
type of font and the alignment on
the wall.

There are still changes being
made to the contract but we hope it
will be signed soon. There have
been some delays with vacation
time but it is hoped that activity will
move quicker now.

Thank you all for your
support and prayers, this will ensure
our project's success.

It is expected that those HK veterans that are able to attend will get a lot

of media coverage, so care must be given not to tire them to the detriment of their health.

Books - I can't let this opportunity go by without reporting on yet another book about the Far East. This one is "The Jack Ford Story" by Jack Fitzgerald. It is based on a series of interviews with Jack Ford, a Newfoundlander who joined the RAF in the early years of World War II, and was captured by the Japanese at Singapore.

Jack's memory is remarkable, when we consider that the interviews took place in 2006 and 2007, sixty plus years after the war, but, on the other hand, those atrocities are burned into our memories and will never be forgotten.

Jack witnessed, or should I say, experienced the dropping of the plutonium bomb at Nagasaki, because, by his account, he fortunately had his back turned to the blast. Thus, in all probability, his eyesight was saved, because the camp he was in, Fukuoka #2, was at seven kilometres from ground zero. It is also a miracle that he suffered only minor cancer illness as a result of radiation.

His accounts of the atrocities that he witnessed and endured parallel those of other stories from prison camps in Japan and throughout the Far East.

Jack is now eighty-seven and is living in Saint John's, Newfoundland.

The book is available at Chapters-Indigo, where I purchased it for less than \$30.00 delivered.

resources that might be used on our website.

Ontario Education Committee Report - Pat Turcotte, Chair

There have been a number of rather exciting developments in the Ontario Region.

We learned that there would be a special seminar on September 23rd at the University of Toronto's Robarts Library in which our Executive was asked to participate. The event marks the official opening of the Richard Charles Lee Canada-Hong Kong Library in the Robarts building. The new library's mandate relates to all aspects of the relationship between Hong Kong and Canada, but the Director, Dr. Jack Leong, was quick to suggest that because of the role Canadian soldiers played in Hong Kong it would be important for our organization to play a role in the seminar itself.

There will be two groups of speakers, three in the first group and three in the second. Each speaker will have 15 minutes, and there will be time for questions following his or her presentation. The first group will consist of George MacDonell, "Flash" Clayton and Sen. Vivienne Poy. After a short break the second group will continue the dialogue. The second group will involve Jessica Li, Postdoctoral Fellow at York University, Bernard Luk, Professor at that same University, and Stanley Kwan who has written a book titled "My Home and My Country: Memoirs of an Old Hongkongan". The final discussion will be chaired by Tong Lam, Professor of History at U. of T.

Ken Skelton will be providing a special display related to the role of the Canadians in the Battle of Hong Kong, and our Education Committee will have a display table as well, where guests will have an opportunity to purchase our Ten Lessons in English or French, as well as George MacDonell's "One Soldier's Story" and Bernard Castonguay's "Prisonnier de guerre au Japon (1941-1945)".

The event will undoubtedly provide much information. There is no admission charge, and anyone is welcome to join us at 10 a.m. on the 8th Floor of the Robarts Library.

Our Committee met just recently in the company of two individuals who want to work with us on several projects. The first person, Alyssa Wong, is employed by Toronto ALPHA, and is involved with several programs that would be of interest to us. One in particular relates to our veterans, and another to the Resource Guide, which their organization has been able to promote in the High Schools of Ontario.

We have also agreed to provide a workshop on November 1st for an ALPHA Conference being held in Toronto from October 31st to November 2nd. Our second guest is a new member of HKVCA Ontario Region by the name of Sandy Madar. He is particularly interested in strengthening our relationship with the Chinese-Canadian community, and has some interesting proposals.

As we do each year, we'll be taking part in OHASSTA, the Ontario History and Social Science Teachers' Convention on November 7th and 8th. We will need volunteers to assist us for each of the two days, starting as early as 8 a.m., and going right through to 5 p.m. Give us a hand if you can! We have also accepted an invitation to be involved in the Durham History Teachers' Association's student conference entitled "Highlights of History" on December 16th and 17th, 2008. This event also involves our being present two days. We encourage members in Ontario who have an interest in spreading the word about the Hong Kong story to get in touch with us.

Members of the Executive and the Education Committee have had a first look at the Multimedia/Seminar material being prepared by Sue Beard, and are quite impressed. A final version should be available in the near future.

Pat has updated the Cross Canada Essay Contest information on the HKVCA Website. Committee members will be working to encourage teachers to involve their students in the contest. The Essay Contest will be part of all future Workshop presentations.

Letters prepared by Nick Brune regarding possible workshops in the Fall have been sent to several

Faculties of Education and other post-Secondary institutions, as well as a number of High School Boards. A follow-up will be initiated near the end of August. Articles are also being prepared for the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF) and the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT) to increase awareness of our Association and our workshops.

We're pleased to announce that Nick Brune has agreed to act as Co-Chair of the Education Committee of Ontario Region. We much appreciate his continuing commitment.

Remembrances

In HKVCA we believe that each Hong Kong veteran has a unique and important story to tell, as do the veterans' families. For most of us, the mechanics of actually structuring and publishing this story seem to be complex and overwhelming, yet to leave it undone doesn't seem right either. To help families out, HKVCA is providing a new service designed to assist those who wish to publish a veteran's story. The word 'story' is used very generally here - it might include wartime experiences, post-war life, family anecdotes, along with images.

We are now unveiling this new service on our main HKVCA web site. On the pages there you'll find all the information you need from structuring the text, page layout, best way to include photos, and steps for actually publishing the story on the World Wide Web. We'll be providing expert advice courtesy of our HKVCA Web administrators. This service is a "work in progress", but you can get an idea of what is involved by visiting:

- limited research of historical data (Vince Lopata's database)
- links to examples
- guidance in where to locate the web site (HKVCA-hosted or not)
- domain registration
- authoring tools
- layout templates
